On November 15, 1982, the Northwest Power Planning Council adopted its Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program. Section 1200 of the program contains measures which address the development of new hydroelectric facilities. Measure 1204(c) calls for a study of alternative means for designating critical stream reaches and wildlife habitat areas to be protected from future hydroelectric development on a systemwide basis.

During the development of the Fish and Wildlife Program a number of habitat areas were proposed for such protection. The Council is providing you with the full list of those areas so that you will be aware that these areas will be undergoing evaluation for possible protection from further hydroelectric development. The Council hopes that this information will be of use to you in planning for future hydroelectric resources.
